SAFEGUARDING

Calderdale officers find safeguarding procedures are very effective at Northowram Primary School!

Before Christmas, we welcomed two members of Calderdale's safeguarding team into school (Steve Barnes - Calderdale Schools Safeguarding Advisor and Ian Curry - School improvement Partner) to spend a full day conducting a Safeguarding Deep-Dive to rigorously audit and check the effectiveness of our safeguarding processes. Officers spent time in and around school including over the lunchtime period, checked documentation and spoke to a range of pupils. Checks included our staff safeguarding checks and training, processes linked to attendance, our safeguarding curriculum, site security, behaviour of pupils and procedures linked to behaviour management and anti-bullying. We have now received our final report which identifies that safeguarding processes linked to all areas are effective and that safeguarding is very well-led and managed in school. No areas for immediate action were found and a number of recommendations made have already been actioned and will help make our safeguarding processes even better.



FOREST SCHOOL

We offer forest school to all pupils in Reception and Year 1, Year 3 and Year 4. Visiting forest school in all seasons is a key part of outdoor learning and this week, children have kept busy and warm enjoying activities including making bug hotels and cooking dough sticks on the fire. Mrs Scardifield joined forest school on one of the coldest days this week and was served a delicious meal of freshly popped popcorn and warm Ribena delicious! We are committed to maintaining our forest school and know that it contributes a great deal to children's personal development and well-being. GOVERNOR DAY

We welcomed our school governors into school in December for one our regular Governor days. Governors are volunteers who provide a vital part of our school's leadership offering challenge, support and encouragement to us all in school as we continue our journey to achieve our school's vision 'Inspiring Success Bevond of Expectation.' Being in school gives governors a valuable opportunity to observe first-hand and hold school to account forthe policies and practices that we discuss in meetings. A lively, practical year 3 design and technology was seen where children's creativity in design and accuracy in diagrams and evaluations were noted and it was noted that our history and geography lessons were clearly offering our pupils much more than the national curriculum requires us to provide. It was a wonderful day and we are very thankful for the time and expertise of our governors that brings such benefits to our school.
